

Dear Residents of Roberts,

This month, I would like to discuss an item that has been running in the Carbon County news the last few weeks. Due to new legislation last year, we are now being asked to share our projected raises in taxes to any permissive funds. Permissive funds are funds that the school administration makes recommendation to the school board to approve, the school board then makes the final decision to approve or to not approve, but they never get to a community vote.

Currently in Montana, a school can permissively levy to the following funds: Tuition; Transportation; Bus Depreciation; Adult Education & Building Reserve. All of these funds are formula funded, meaning we have a cap as to how much we can permissively levy. Below you will see the likely changes to your local taxes. As is traditionally the case these changes will be formalized at the August School Board Meeting.

Looking at the total line you can see the effect of the overall increases and decreases. We tried our best, as we always do, to be fiscally responsible to the school and to the local taxpayers. We have also decided to once again not run a levy to our district General Fund.

On a positive funding note we are currently working to utilize our funds received from the Montana Comprehensive Literacy Program Grant. This award of \$750,000 over the next three years is already being put to use. We have hired a literacy coach who is starting in April. Her name is Katherine Raines and she comes to us after working eight years between Casper and Sheridan. She will be working on a part time basis through the remainder of the school year. We are also working with a Literacy Consultant. His name is William Vancleave. He comes to us out a consulting company out of Bozeman. He will be working with our staff a few times a month and helping us institute best practices. His background is as a teacher and instructional coach who has also written multiple books on how to teach literacy to students of all ages. We are very excited to have these two individuals joining our team.

RPPA Springs into Spring!

The Roberts Parents for the Performing Arts is excited this Spring, to showcase the performing arts at Roberts School with a full agenda of drama and music for students and community.

A **Sound and Light Workshop** on Friday, March 9 provided interested students in 7-12 to experience the basics of production sound and stage light programming. Experts from Dia Events in Billings presented students with a special Friday School hands-on experience. Newly learned skills from the workshop were utilized by students a week later at the annual **RPPA Talent Show** on March 16, which featured a one-act play, followed by 18 various student-generated skits, musical selections, an illustrated talk and even a martial arts demonstration. During intermission an appreciative audience was invited to view a student art exhibit arranged by Sheila Roberts and Misty Pitts. The play "Stormitt's Gold" written by local Kathy Bauer and directed by English teacher Ashley McCoy and RPPA member Jahna White, can boast 100% participation by dozens of Roberts School students in grades 7-8! The action begins after the homecoming game, when several athletes and cheerleaders learn about colorful and spooky characters from Roberts' past. The students share the fascinating story of Stormitt, an early-day Roberts hermit who raised and sold prize horses. Throughout the years locals have heard treasure stories about the gold coins that he buried near his land...gold that has never been found. Highlights from the play include the school's rich history, such as its being used as a 'hospital' during the Spanish flu epidemic. In one eerie scene the students encounter ghost children at the Roberts Cemetery, victims of that epidemic. The students seek help from the school's fabled ghost children and Stormitt's ghost in an attempt to retrieve the gold and buy new uniforms for Roberts Rocket teams. The premiere of the play provided a fitting tribute to the Roberts School during its 100th year birthday celebration.

An upcoming event, **Montana Shakes**, from the Shakespeare in the Parks program, is on May 1. High-energy actors present a fun and educational look at characters and themes from Shakespearean plays via a comical play unique to their program. Following the play, nine smaller workshops will teach elementary students some exciting elements of drama. This is the third time the RPPA has been able to bring this outstanding group to the school.



Finally the RPPA is excited to announce the purchase of a new Clavinova for the music department to replace the well-worn one bought 25 years ago. This "high-tech piano", which utilizes computer programming, is an integral element in the concerts and other programs at the school. The RPPA utilized a generous gift of \$2,000 from the Seidman Foundation, along with help from the Roberts Community Foundation to purchase this new gem. 


